JERI BAKER, Librarian at Wilshire Baptist Church in Dallas, will discuss myths and stereotypes, reading interests and outreach to baby boomers and sandwich-generation adults. Drawing from his extensive knowledge of Lewis's life and writing, St. Thomas High School English instructor **ANDREW LAZO** will explore some of the reasons why, in the age of Modernism, Lewis turned to myth, fairytale, symbol and story to communicate more clearly the things that matter most.

DR. DIANA SEVERANCE, Director of the Dunham Family Bible Museum at Houston Baptist University, will focus on the earliest English Bibles from the translations of John Wycliffe and William Tyndale to the King James Version.
